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MINISTER'S MESSAGE

“BEST OF ALL, GOD IS WITH US”

The above is a Wesley quotation and title to one of his hymns, it is also the Conference Presidential theme of 2020. As I pen this annual letter the above statement rings true. 2020 became a year many wished to either do over or never think about again. It promised so much as a new year and yet as soon as it began we realised a worldwide, global disaster was unfolding. By March there were lockdowns imposed, no unnecessary going out, working from home and no travel.

Life as we knew it changed literally overnight. The worst was the hospitalisations and many deaths due to Covid-19 infections. After the initial shock, as churches we learnt new ways of offering worship virtually. Pastoral care and support was done over the phone and later at distanced door step visits. There were also intermittent lifting of lockdowns and churches would open; mask wearing, sanitising and social distancing became the order of the day. We struggled with not being able to sing and later to sing with masks on. Yet through it all and best of all is that God is with us.

In 2021, as humans do we had adjusted to this new normal. We tested doing those activities that encouraged our fellowship such as Christmas carols, nativity and fish and chips lunches. These were greatly appreciated. In the midst of Covid uncertainty, PCR testing for travel, our world began to open up again. We individually were left to make the decision about the levels of precaution we needed to take and we still do.

As a church we miss those of our members who due to ill health cannot venture out to worship any more.

We mourn the loss of friends who have died and we look forward to a year of new opportunities and challenges that with God on our side we will surmount.

As a circuit, we have recognised the need to take stock of the effectiveness of our mission and ministry with the resources we have – the church buildings, manses, ministerial staff, finances and volunteers. Currently, our circuit has nine churches, one community centre project, four ministers and a hardworking group of volunteers in each church though waiting due to age and unable to get more to join. Some of our buildings are in need of extensive and expensive repairs. Most churches are managing with office holders doubling the offices they hold. Connexional shortages on ministers will impact us when at least two of our ministers' appointments come to an end in 2024. Through a process of consultation and conversation we hope to find a positive way forward of streamlining our mission directive, even if this means closing some of our churches and going down to three ministers. We prayerfully continue this program.

It is my wish that as a church we will extend an open invitation to all who walk through our doors to find a ready space at our fellowship table. We have seen new people join us for worship and some already feeling at home. I am however aware of those who have come a few times but not stayed. May God make us a welcome space for all.

continuing to provide us with uplifting, encouraging and thought provoking words to begin our day. It has also been wonderful to keep up to date with news from our church family.

The circuit has led discussions to help us look at how we move into the future and what the configuration of churches and staffing may look like. The discussions are pertinent as currently all our ministers are due to leave in 2023/24. This is ongoing work and it has been gratifying to see so many of you joining the meetings. We hosted a moving Circuit service of Remembrance and have also invited the Circuit to Ash Wednesday and Maundy Thursday services. We look forward to being more involved in the life of the circuit and to the benefits this can bring us all.

We have sadly lost a number of members this year and others have not as yet been able to return. There have been less volunteers available for duties on a Sunday, making it difficult to cover all the tasks. But, like the beautiful bulbs that are now flowering around the church, we look to the future with hope and trust that God will make a way.

TREASURER

Income

The freewill offerings for the first 6 months of this financial year are in line with our budget. Many thanks for your continued support.

Repairs and Replacements

Due to the restraints placed on us over the past 2 years, some items are now in need of repairs and replacements. This includes replacing the hall windows. These additional costs will take us over budget.

Rentals

I am happy to say that many of our lettings have returned. As a result, revenue is up and in excess of budget.

Energy Costs

As you will appreciate our costs for gas and electricity have increased considerably. Unfortunately our fixed tariff expired in January, but we were able to negotiate a new 6 month

fixed tariff. Despite this, costs are running high and we should all try to conserve our energy consumption. As always, we continue to keep a tight rein on our expenditure, to ensure that we have the necessary funds when required.

GIFT AID

I am pleased to present the Gift Aids Report for the tax year ended 5th April 2021. In total, we were able to reclaim a total of £5999 from the taxman. In the previous year that ended on 5th April 2020, we reclaimed a total of £6215. For the year earlier that ended on 5th April 2019, we reclaimed a total of £8171.

As you can see, we have been reclaiming a declining amount of Gift Aid refunds each year. This is partly due to the C-19 Pandemic and the resultant church closure. The other reason is the declining church membership. Overall, we received less from our church family in the last tax year as part of the envelope scheme and as church service collections. The more collections we make the higher the Gift Aid refund from the taxman. We, therefore, as a church family needs to do everything possible to increase church attendance by attracting new members and each of us giving a little extra. The easiest way to contribute is to set up a weekly or monthly standing order from your bank account.

Donating through Gift Aid means we can claim an extra 25p for every £1 you give. It will not cost you any extra. If anyone is interested in joining our envelope scheme or learning more about Gift Aid, please feel free to contact me or our treasurer John Higgins.

PROPERTY

Given the continued shortfall in our lettings income due to the Covid pandemic the Property Committee decided not to undertake any discretionary expenditure during the last financial year. However, there are many costs that cannot be deferred such as the Health & Safety checks and those essential repairs required to keep the premises operational. As a result, we still needed to spend over £14,000 just to keep our buildings safe and functioning. However, two years on there is now something of a backlog of redecorating work which we are intending to complete this spring.

With the Covid issues easing and our lettings income increasing the Property and Finance Committee have agreed to recommend a programme of investment in our premises to the Church Council. The first two projects are an upgrade to the sound system in the church and the addition of streaming and audio visual capabilities. The second project is to complete the double glazing of the windows in the Hall building. This will reduce the ongoing maintenance requirement and should conserve heat making the Hall more comfortable for all.

As ever, I wish to thank everyone who has supported property matters over the last year including members of the committee and those on the nightly security rota. However, I would particularly like to thank Mike on behalf of the church for all that he does. As well as looking after the website and the duty notification emails, he undertakes the weekly check of the Fire Alarm system and willingly makes himself available to help with repair jobs around the premises and to let contractors in when necessary. Thanks Mike.

COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

Over the last 12 months and as the Covid pandemic has eased we have seen a slow but steady increase in the community activities taking place on our premises. As well as the Pre School we have been able to welcome the Uniting Friends charity which provides day care services for adults with learning difficulties. In addition, we now have number of fitness classes, two Christian worship groups, the Earl Grey Band, the Workers Education Association and others. As well as ensuring that our premises are put to good use, the income we derive from the lettings is essential to keep the church financially viable. In the year to August 2021 the rental income amounted to approx. £35,000. Whilst this is a substantial sum, we need to generate closer to £50,000 in rental income in order to run and fully maintain our premises. The Property & Finance Committee are hopeful that we can achieve this level of rental income this financial year.

SAFEGUARDING

I am pleased to be able to report that our safeguarding practice and procedures at The Drive place us in a positive position. This became evident from the comprehensive audit issued in 2021, and remains ongoing as a tool to identify areas of achievement, change and improvement. This document was issued by the Methodist Church to assess where safeguarding support is required. It demonstrates just one example the Methodist Church has taken to improve and promote a safer culture in our churches, having accepted the opportunity to participate in the Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse and has taken careful note of the conclusions and recommendations of the Investigation Report

for the module of Child Protection in Religious Organisations and Settings.

Since my previous report, we are now following the Safer Recruitment Policy and have job descriptions and procedures for all our valuable volunteer workers across the many roles that exist in church life. In addition, we have a lone working policy, up to date DBS checks and thanks to collaboration with Jeremy Foster, all lettings are aware of the need to have their own Safeguarding policy, DBS checks and an acceptance of the Safeguarding policy of The Drive Methodist Church. I have been able to assist those lettings where necessary.

Safeguarding is a responsibility of us all, so it is a pleasure to be working more closely with our team of Stewards and hope to attend their meetings periodically to keep them updated.

Over the past 2 years, there was a huge disruption to the provision of training, both Foundation and Advanced across the country. It took a while to roll out Zoom programmes, but initially people were not keen to mix with other circuits to complete the training programmes. Many in the Barking, Dagenham and Ilford circuit remain in need of training as the last opportunity occurred in 2017. As I completed the Train the Trainer programme over lockdown, I will be pleased to welcome those from The Drive to a Foundation Module Training on 23rd April. Following this I will be able to support the provision of training in other churches in the circuit.

Recently Mmasape has set up a safeguarding buddying plan between The Drive and Gants Hill where a new safeguarding officer has been identified. This is a new and interesting element to my role. I am grateful for the support from the church family at The Drive.

Music@TheDrive

If the last two years have taught us only one thing, I think it's how to be flexible and go with the flow! In this spirit, we are bringing the Choir, Chorale, organ and instrumentalists all under the heading of Music@TheDrive.

The idea is to be able to choose the right music and musicians for the right occasion. This is not as radical as it might sound – for example, the choir will still be visible week by week, but they might not always be in robes in the choir stalls. We are keen to be inspired by ideas from TDY and the young adults in our congregation. Just recently on Palm Sunday we used a song by Stormzy which successfully involved all our singers.

Going back to tradition, it was a joy to be back in church to sing for Harvest Festival in September, and to be able to have our Carol Service in church again in December. As I write we are looking forward to our first Easter Day in church since 2019.

We have now been using our hymnal Singing the Faith for ten years, and my latest statistical analysis showed that we have used 57% of the available hymns at least once in that time.

We've begun the process of revising the Drive Songbook, which is also 10 years old, to take out the songs that are now in Singing the Faith and include some of the best of the latest worship songs.

As restrictions on our daily lives are lifted, we will look into musical events that can involve both the church and wider communities. As we discuss the future of the BDI Circuit, we should also be using music as a unifying force for our churches.

My thanks to all in the Choir for their time and commitment in attending regular Thursday practices again, and to all who have sung with the Chorale, enriching our worship at The Drive. Thanks also to Mmasape and all in the congregation for the support and encouragement that you give.

THE DRIVE PRE-SCHOOL

The Drive pre-school has been serving the Local Community and beyond since 1974, offering Early Years Education to children aged 2-5 years old.

The Drive pre-school is an extremely inclusive practice and children with their families from all walks of life are warmly welcomed. We celebrate the breadth of the diversity of both children and adults in our pre-school, appreciating the different cultures and religions these bring. We have families from around the world, including India, Pakistan, Bangladesh, Ethiopia, Romania, Cyprus, Italy, South Africa, The Gambia, Turkey, Afghanistan and Sri Lanka.

We promote independence from an early age, by teaching the children to do things for themselves such as: take themselves to the toilet, wash and dry their hands, serve their own snacks and drinks, wash up their dirty dishes, tidy up before they go in the garden and take off and put on their coats.

We are all very proud that Ofsted has awarded us an "Outstanding" provider and this is due to the hard work that goes into everyday life of the pre-school by the whole staff team. This is very special to the pre-school, as it gives it recognition for all the excellent work we do with the children, to prepare them for their next step in their learning journey. We believe that firm foundations are laid for the children's future, as a result of the outstanding work we do.

Covid and the lockdown, has created a situation that has left a lot of children with speech delay and a reluctance to separate from their parents. We have experienced a challenging time to settle new children as they are taking a lot longer to get settled than before.

We are currently supporting seventeen children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities. We have all the plans in place to meet their individual needs and support them and their families on this journey.

Below are two quotes from our Ofsted report that highlights what the Drive pre-school is all about.

"Staff have a relentless dedication to supporting every individual child, including those with additional needs, to help them make excellent progress".

"The manager is passionate and leads the well qualified team to provide the best possible care and learning for all children who attend this pre-school".

I would like to express my thanks and gratitude to the whole staff team at the pre-school, as their hard work and dedication is what has given the Drive pre-school the good name and reputation we have in our local community.
