

OUR MINISTER SAYS

Mothering Sunday falls on 14th March. ‘Mother Church’ is the traditional theme for this particular Sunday and we mark the day accordingly. Mother Church has many different meanings. It might be that we identify the church where we grew up as Mother Church, or it may be that we think in terms of the global community of Christians spread throughout the world as Mother Church, being the body of Christ. John Wesley recognised the global nature of the church when he said, ‘The world is my parish’.

The world was indeed John Wesley’s parish as Methodism has since become a principle Church throughout the world. According to the BBC website (http://www.bbc.co.uk/religion/religions/christianity/subdivisions/methodist_1.shtml) There are Methodist Churches in nearly every country in the world and global membership numbers some 70 million people. There are more Methodists in the world than the population of the United Kingdom!

One of the first areas of the world to embrace Methodism was the Caribbean. This year celebrates 250 years of Methodist work in that region. In 1758, Nathaniel Gilbert, a plantation owner from Antigua, arrived with two slaves at a house in Wandsworth which was owned by his brother Francis. While he was there, an itinerant preacher, the Revd. John Wesley, visited on a number of occasions. It was not only the Gilberts who were impressed by Mr Wesley’s message, Nathaniel’s slaves also responded and were baptised by Mr Wesley. In June 1759, Nathaniel Gilbert and his slaves left Wandsworth to return to Antigua and it was from their preaching and teaching that the Methodist work developed.

Next month at Westminster Central Hall on 24th April there is to be a District Celebration to mark this 250 year anniversary of the work in the Caribbean.

This Mothering Sunday as we think of our own mothers we can also be thankful to God for the Global Mother Church of whose children many make up our own congregation.

will take us on a journey to discover some ways in which Jesus fulfils Old Testament prophecy and the sacrificial system.

ASH WEDNESDAY 17th FEBRUARY - 8.00 SERVICE at ST ANDREW'S - THE DRIVE

In Session 1 Tuesday 23rd February - we will look at the story of Abraham and Isaac and the substitute sacrifice. We will understand more of the promises and mercy of God.

In Session 2 Tuesday 2nd March - we focus on Moses, the Passover Lamb, and the protection afforded by the blood of the lamb. Our studies will give us glimpse of the glory of God.

In Session 3 Tuesday 9th March - we take a closer look at the sacrificial system, considering why it was needed and what was achieved. In so doing, we will learn more of the grace and righteousness of God.

In Session 4 Tuesday 16th March- our subject will be John the Baptist as forerunner of Jesus and the identification of Jesus as the Lamb of God, which will point us to a deeper appreciation of the love of God?

In Session 5 Tuesday 23rd March - we shall turn to the death of the Lamb - the permanent solution to the problem of sin - and what that reveals of the holiness of God.

THE ROAD TO CHRISTIAN UNITY

The week of Prayer for Christian Unity took place, as usual, between 18th and 25th January.

All the half hour services took place at noon in the Hospital Chapel on Ilford Hill. Each service was taken by a different church. The Hospital Chapel took the Thursday service, which was followed by the regular Thursday Eucharist. The theme this year was "Witness" and the familiar story from Luke chapter 24, The Road to Emmaus. Each preacher took a different aspect from the excellent accompanying booklet.

On Thursday Father Barnes deviated slightly from the theme. He warned us that Christianity is under threat, not from other faiths, but from secularism. Certain politicians and people in the media are attempting to undermine Christianity.

On Sunday afternoon there was a united service at the Salvation Army in Clements Road. When sharing the peace, we were asked to find someone we did not know. This was not easy for most of us who had attended the Hospital Chapel services. One piece of sad news united us more than almost anything else. That was the death of Peter Foley. (see next item)

PETER FOLEY

The death of historian and campaigner, Peter Foley, was announced during the week of prayer. Peter was a member of St Peter and St Paul's Catholic Church. He was one of the original guides at the Hospital Chapel, and had written books about both places.

On Friday 29th January about two hundred people attended the funeral at St Peter and St Paul's. Father Tom Levin had "taken" his parishioners and preached at "their" service of unity in the Hospital Chapel the previous week. Father Levin officiated at the funeral service.

Father Barnes gave the homily. He talked about Peter's ability to communicate his vast knowledge of history, how he kept listeners spellbound and of his love of the Essex countryside. It was an inspiring address. Father Barnes reminded us that we were there not only to think of our loss but to commend Peter to the Lord.
