We spent the first weekend going to Cape Coast Castle and to Kakum National Park where we did a canopy walk on rope bridges. It was an hour's hike to the bridges but it was fun and we were able to see some animals on the way up. The view from the bridges was amazing!!! At the castle, we had a great tour guide called Sebastian and he told us everything we needed to know about what happened to the

slaves at Cape Coast. The stories were a little shocking but I was able to get some good photos as we were by the coast and the sea was raging!

The second weekend we went to a monkey sanctuary and to Wli waterfalls. It was a long hike up to the waterfalls and we had to cross 9 bridges over water to get to it. We sang along the way and spotted wildlife. The waterfalls were great and it was truly magical having not seen one before. We had a lot of group selfies! The monkey sanctuary was an amazing experience as well. I was able to have three monkeys sit on my arm as they ate the bananas I held out. Some of them were very cheeky as they just jumped up and ripped the banana out of my hand but I did see a baby monkey hanging off its mother so that was cute.

During the week, we spent our time at the school teaching lessons and doing construction work which involved us making concrete by hand, laying it and then screeding. The construction work was great and we were able to convince the men at African Adventures and at the school, that women are strong which is always good. Teaching the lessons was fun and gave me new skills in leadership and confidence which will be useful to me in the future.

We were able to start a Girl Guiding unit up at the school which was great and the girls had so much fun. We also got to meet the actual Girl Guides of Ghana and we spent some time with them. It was very special.

There were 8 other girls on the trip with me and I can honestly say that we're all very, very good friends. I wouldn't have wanted to go with anyone else and we will definitely all stay in contact. They all made the trip sooo much fun in their own ways and the leaders were great too. I couldn't have asked for better leaders. We all had such good times like the karaoke we had on the long drives and the laughs we had about silly things!!!

Narrow Gauge Wales

When Louise was a teenager she once commented that "on holiday in Italy all we do is look at churches and in Cornwall all we do is look at gardens!" If Louise had been with us on our recent visit to Wales she might have added "and in Wales all we do is look at narrow gauge railways". There are at least thirteen narrow gauge railways in Wales and during our week long holiday we managed to travel on seven of them.

On our first day we travelled on the Fairbourne railway. The line is 15 inch gauge and little more than a mile long terminating at the end of a sand spit on the south side of the Barmouth estuary. However, by using the ferry across the river to Barmouth and the Cambrian Coast rail service we completed a circular route back to Fairbourne. On the Monday we visited Llandudno and took a ride on the Great Orme Tramway. Opened in 1902 this is the UK's only surviving cable hauled street tramway.

On Tuesday we managed to complete a route that has been on my "bucket list" for some time. We took the Ffestiniog Railway from Portmadog to Blaenau Ffestiniog. The line was built to carry slate from the mines down to Porthmadog and opened in 1836. It closed in 1946, but reopened in 1955 as a preservation line. From Blaenau we caught the Network

Rail service to Bangor and then a bus to Caernarfon. From there we boarded the Welsh Highland Railway, another old slate line, back to Porthmadog.

Wednesday did not go to plan. I had decided to walk up Snowdon to meet Diane, who was to come up on the Snowdon Mountain Railway. Unfortunately all the train tickets were sold out. However, by some quirk there was one seat

left on the 13.30 return train, so I can also claim a ride on this famous narrow gauge railway. In the afternoon we took a ride on the Llanberis Lake Railway. On Thursday we took a day off from trains.

On the Friday we rode on the wonderful Talylyn Railway. Like many of the narrow gauge railways it was built to carry slate, but also operated a regular passenger service. The line closed in 1950 following the death of Sir Henry Haydn Jones who owned the railway. His widow gifted the line to the Talylyn Railway Preservation Society and thus it became the UK's first preservation railway.

I will be showing some photos of our travels at our annual Action For Children Slides Evening on 25 November.

Disaster relief for the Caribbean

The Methodist Church in Britain is raising money to support the humanitarian aid and relief work following the heavy rains and winds causing disaster across the Caribbean.

The Church is working with its humanitarian aid and relief partner in the Caribbean, the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), which is supporting affected communities as soon as their needs are assessed.

Following Hurricane Irma, Bishop Otto Wade, the President of the Methodist Church in the Caribbean and the Americas, wrote that "Barbuda, Antigua's sister isle has been devastated. Anguilla, St Martin/Sint Maarten, USVI, and the British Virgin Islands were all greatly affected. As was the Turks and Caicos Islands of the Bahamas/Turks and Caicos Islands Conference. Many homes have been destroyed or have lost their roofs, as have some churches."

See It. Say It. Sorted.

Following the recent terrorist incident on the London Underground, the Metropolitan Police have contacted us to say that they are asking tube and rail passengers and people who use railway stations to help keep themselves

and others safe by reporting unusual items or activity on the railway.

Their message is to be ALERT not alarmed.

See It - Please remain vigilant for anything that seems out of place or unusual on trains or at stations. This could include:

-) Someone being somewhere they shouldn't be, for example trying to get through a door marked 'no entry'
-) An unattended bag
-) Someone checking security arrangements, for example filming CCTV cameras at a station
-) Someone avoiding rail staff and police officers
-) Someone who could be concealing something under their clothing.

Say It -If you see something that doesn't feel right, we want to hear from you. Let us decide if what you have seen or what you know is important.

You should tell a member of rail staff or a police officer what you have seen. You can also call us on 0800 40 50 40, or text us on 61016. In an emergency, always call 999.

Sorted - We will check any information you give us thoroughly. In an emergency call 999 - For non emergencies call 101 - For the Anti-Terrorist Hotline call 0800 789321.
