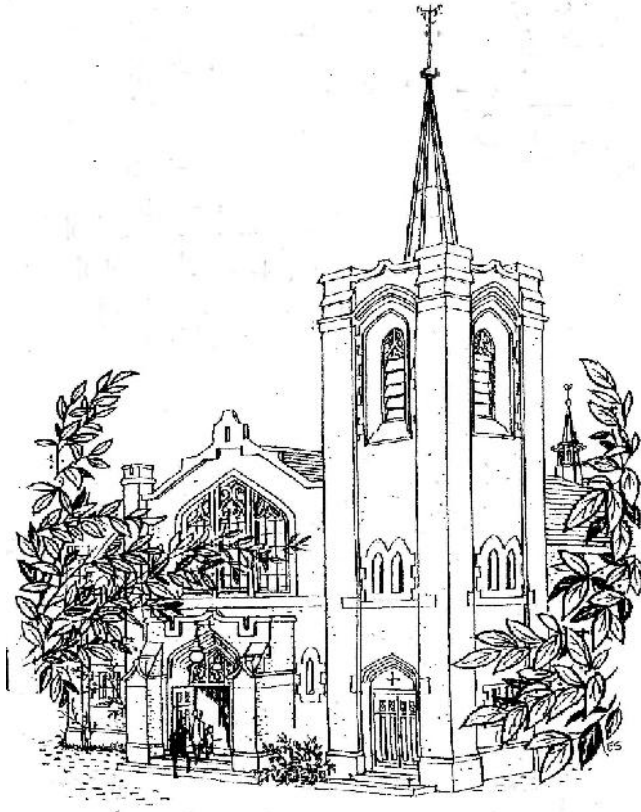

Friends

In the meantime try to be safe wherever you may be and whatever you may be doing. God help us.

The circuit is going through changes at the moment, with changing pastoral charges and even more to come as we prepare to look for a new presbyter for September 2020. We will all be asked to accommodate these changes which will affect us all. But in process of it, we need to still ask God for guidance as to what His mission is for us, and what our role may be in fulfilling God's mission.

As politics continue to be a bit messy, may I ask each of us to pray for this country, her politicians and our future. How do we interpret the recent European elections and its results in this country and around Europe. What are the implications for the outcome? Are we becoming insulated or can we still be part of the global village and how will that impact our lives?

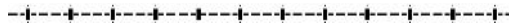
Please, let us continue to pray for the world, for peace, for the end of oppression and injustices around the world.

## Which one would you choose?

During a recent TDY session our young people were asked whether they would have chosen to witness the parting of the Red Sea or the resurrection of Jesus.

Here are their responses:

*Ayo says "I would have rather been at Jesus' resurrection because He is an amazing saviour. Also, it is a once in a lifetime opportunity which is more talked about in the future."*

*Yetunde says "I would rather have been at Jesus' resurrection because that was the beginning on which Christianity was founded upon. Jesus being resurrected from the dead is a symbol of God's omni benevolence and shows that death can be overcome. Therefore it gives people hope as well as encourages people to live well in order to attain eternal life"*

Seeing God's belief in normal people is more powerful because it shows that everyone is amazing because God believes in them."*

*Daro says "I would rather have been at the parting of the Red Sea because many people escaped Egypt and were set free after years of being there. Pharaoh was a bad person and the Israelites deserved to be set free."*

## **Redbridge Faith Forum meetings**

### **Transformation of Ilford Town Centre**

On Tuesday 30<sup>th</sup> October 2018, Redbridge Faith Forum held a lunchtime meeting on the above topic. Up till now there has been no evening follow up meeting.

So what transformation is planned? It has been suggested that a purpose built covered market should be put on the Town Hall Car Park. This is to discourage people from travelling by car to Ilford. (The experts don't seem to realise that car drivers are already avoiding Ilford and going elsewhere).

Does anyone remember the Pioneer Market – the wool shop, greengrocers, fishmongers, hardware and curtain shop? Only the clock shop seems to have survived across the road. Very useful it is too. (Other clock shops are available). What happened to the Pioneer Market? The site was under the twin “white elephant” which can be seen for miles.

The new proposed market would provide cooked food for customers – as if there aren't enough people in central Ilford walking around eating. The other plans were, in my opinion, even more outlandish. So much for the experts. Meanwhile, the town centre deteriorates even more. Bus stops are being moved to dangerous places. Be careful if you change buses outside Redbridge Central Library as the new board walk is treacherous. There is nowhere to sit, no shelter, no board indicator. Is this progress?

## **Community Hubs**

This was another lunch time meeting of the Redbridge Faith Forum held on Tuesday 30<sup>th</sup> April at the Ilford Islamic Centre.

What is a "Community Hub"? It seems to me that important services have been cut because of lack of funding. Money has been granted to produce buildings for no set purpose. Seven Kings and Gants Hill are the first proposed hubs. It sounded as if Gants Hill Library might be used.

There were two speakers - Randal Smith is the London Borough of Redbridge Interim Head of Policy, Equalities and Communities. Andy Paice is an Involve Associate.

Luckily in the audience was a person who has been involved for many years with Voluntary Care. This person explained that it is no good building hubs without providing transport to get people there. Clubs for the elderly and disabled have closed down so those able to get themselves to cafes and pubs sit for hours over their cups of tea and coffees.

The two speakers expected volunteers to run things not realising that all organisations are seeking volunteers. An evening meeting is really needed to spread awareness of these plans.
