'My Life In Lockdown'

I was at home when they told me I wouldn't be coming to school the next day. I was so confused; like a blanket of shock had covered me. The problem was that I knew that there was a virus spreading globally but I didn't expect it to come here so quickly. To be honest I didn't expect there would even be a virus. Nobody did. One of the many things that came to my thoughts was 'What about my friends at school'. I had a feeling my parents were a bit shocked but knew it would have happened sooner or later. I knew it was for my safety, but I couldn't process that at the moment.

The next day my mum showed me an email of what the school had said about how we would be doing our work from now on. We got the work packs. The first thought that came to my mind was 'How did they expect us to do the work without any help from a teacher'. I was so confused. Even worse was that my parents didn't learn the ways I was being taught. Every night I would spot my grandmother watching the news to see if anything had changed since she couldn't go to work. Nothing was the same. I didn't think it would ever change.

The months passed and my mum got an email from my school saying we would be having little sessions with our teacher,

once every week. They weren't helpful though. We weren't even learning. It was close to the summer holidays when they started doing the little sessions, so I only had like five. By the end of the last lesson, it was the summer holiday. I had missed half of my Year 5 life.


The shocking thing was that I was going into a Year 6 classroom next. It felt so unexpected even though I knew I was going there.

Once I stepped into the classroom all my emotions changed. From nervous to slightly happy. I had finally seen my best friends and all my classmates. It felt so weird being in the same room as 29 other children. I can't describe how felt; but if you were there you would probably say the same. It was almost like nobody thought we ever see each other again. Next thing we knew we were filling out Secondary School Applications.

It has been a difficult year, not being able to see family and friends and do fun activities. But it's part of the journey and I've learnt to enjoy the small moments with those around me. All we can do is hope, pray and trust that we all stay safe for it to end soon.





Since the pandemic began the purchase of goods online has increased greatly and scammers have sought to find new ways to part people from their money and many have suffered from these criminal activities.

The popularity of dog ownership has increased to the extent that breeders have many more people on their waiting lists. My friend who has always had a dog in her life found she became one of the many 'would be' owners on a breeders waiting list as she waited to be told there was a dog for her. In the meantime, there was an increase in dog thefts around the country, which apart from causing great distress to the owners, the beloved pet finds itself in unfamiliar surroundings.

Recently my friend called me, she was concerned that she may have been drawn into a scam that convinced her that she was buying a puppy from a breeder. She had paid the deposit with her bank card over the phone and was told she could have the puppy the next day. After we discussed the possibility of this being a scam and a conversation with the 'breeder' she lost her deposit and is now hoping to get a dog from a local breeder when one becomes available. I found myself comparing my friends experience to my own in the Sixties. Online purchasing was a long way off in those days.

Russ came into my life one day as I walked towards Petticoat Lane in London, the path led me through *Club Row, a well-known market that sold animals and birds. It certainly was not going to be the place from where I would buy my dog, I was going to wait until I found a reputable breeder. I glanced across at a stall where a Labrador puppy sat amongst a litter

of tiny puppies. I stopped to stroke him, admired his glossy coat and he looked up at me with big brown eyes. I was in love but walked away and resisted the temptation to buy a dog from a market stall. I could not get him out of my mind and knew that I had to go back. Someone was enquiring about him and hesitated when the sum of £16 was mentioned, I said, " I will have him."




Throughout the past year many people have found that their dogs have brought them friendship, comfort and wellbeing through difficult times, which is exactly what Russ gave me all those years ago.

SAINT GEORGES DAY 23rd April

Who was St George? Did he really slay the Dragon? Why is he such a popular Saint, celebrated in so many Countries, Races, Religions and Organisations?

The celebration of St George's Day is currently fairly low key in England and much celebrated elsewhere.

There are many legends in many cultures about St. George, but they all have a common theme; he must have been an outstanding character in his lifetime, for his reputation to have survived for almost 1,700 years!

Most authorities on the subject seem to agree that he was born in Cappadocia in what is now Turkey, in about the year 280 AD. It is probable from his physical description; tall stature and fair hair that he was of Darian origin. Enlisting into the Cavalry of the Roman Army age 17, he very quickly established a reputation amongst his peers, for his virtuous behaviour and physical strength, his military bearing, valour and handsome good looks.

He quickly achieved the rank of Millenary or Tribunus Militum, an officer's rank roughly equivalent to a full Colonel, in charge of a regiment of 1,000 men and became a particular favourite of his Emperor Diocletian who was a skilled military tactician and strict disciplinarian, who set himself the task of rejuvenating the morale of the citizens of Rome by reviving the prevailing traditions and paganism of Rome. It may be recalled that this was a time of high inflation and civil unrest and one outcome of this was the increasing influence of Christianity.

Diocletian's second in Command was Galerius, the conqueror of Persia and an avid supporter of the Pagan religion. As a

result of a rumour that the Christians were plotting the death of Galerius, an edict was issued that all Christian Churches were to be destroyed and all scriptures to be burnt. Anyone admitting to being a Christian, would lose his rights as a citizen, if not his life. As a consequence, Diocletian took strict action against any alternative forms of religion in general and the Christian faith in particular. He achieved the reputation of being perhaps the cruellest persecutor of Christians at that time.

Many Christians feared to be loyal to their God; but, having become a convert to Christianity, St. George acted to limit the excesses of Diocletian's actions against the Christians. He went to the city of Nicomedia where, upon entering, he tore down the notice of the Emperor's edict. St. George gained great respect for his compassion towards Diocletian's victims.

As news spread of his rebellion against the persecutions St. George realised that, as both Diocletian and Galerius were in the city, it would not be long before he was arrested. Preparing for the event, he disposed of his property to the poor and he freed his slaves.

When he appeared before Diocletian, it is said that St. George bravely denounced him for his unnecessary cruelty and injustice and that he made an eloquent and courageous speech. He stirred the populace with his powerful and convincing rhetoric against the Imperial Decree to persecute Christians. Diocletian refused to acknowledge or accede to St. George's reasoned, reproachful condemnation of his actions and consigned St George to prison with instructions that he be tortured until he denied his faith in Christ.

Defending his faith, St George was beheaded at Nicomedia near Lyddia in Palestine on the 23rd of April in the year 303 AD.

Stories of St. George's courage soon spread, and his reputation grew very quickly. He soon became known in Russia and the Ukraine as the Trophy Bearer and his remains are said to have been buried in the church that bears his name in Lydda. However, his head was carried to Rome, where it was preserved in the Church that is also dedicated to him.

St George was beatified by the Roman Catholic Church and recognised in the liturgy of the Russian Orthodox and Greek Orthodox Churches as well as the Roman Catholic Church. He has been revered in the Ukraine since Christianity was established in 988 AD by Volodymyr the Great; Prince of the Kyivan Empire. The Romanesque Monastic order in Prague established St. George's Church in the Castle in the year 920AD. In the year 1119 AD the Cathedral of St George was founded in Novgorod. His reputation for virtue and chivalrous conduct became the spiritual inspiration of the Crusaders and by this time the pennant or flag with a red cross on a white or silver background became prominent as a means of recognition by English Knights. It was also worn on breast plates.

In the 13th Century, there was a Guild of St. George to which the Honourable Company of Pikemen were related before evolving into the Honourable Artillery Company. Many regiments of the Army still celebrate St. George's Day with great ceremony.

In the year 1348 King Edward III established the Knights of the Garter, which is the oldest order of Chivalry in Europe. The Order of the Garter was dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary, Edward the Confessor and St George. The Insignia of the order consists of a collar and badge appendant known as the George, the Star, the Garter and the Sash with the Investment Badge called the lesser George. This is a gold and richly enamelled representation of St George on horseback slaying the dragon.

In 1352 the College of St George was established in Windsor, with 6 boy Choristers and since then, St George's school has played an important role in the daily worship and on State Occasions in the Queen's Free Chapel of St George in Windsor Castle. By providing free education and sustenance for the boys, a priceless musical inheritance in choral worship has been established and their numbers increased until the Plague struck in 1479 when the numbers were reduced from thirteen to six again but recovered to thirteen by Michaelmas in 1482.

During World War II, King George VI established the George Cross for outstanding acts of Civilian Valour and one of the earliest recipients was the Island of Malta, for its outstanding courage in the face of the constant bombardment by the Italian and German Air Force.



The medieval legend of St George and the dragon says that a dragon made its nest by a freshwater spring near the town of Silene in Libya. When people came to collect water, they inadvertently disturbed the dragon and so offered sheep as a distraction.

After time, there were simply no sheep left for the dragon and so the people of Silene decided to choose a maiden from the town by drawing lots. When the results were read, it was revealed that the princess was to be the dragon's next victim. Despite the Monarch's protest his daughter, Cleolinda, was offered to the dragon.

However, at the moment of offering, a knight from the Crusades came riding by on his white stallion. St George dismounted and drew his sword, protecting himself with the  sign of the cross. He fought the dragon slaying the beast and saving the princess. The people of Silene were

clearly very grateful and abandoned their pagan beliefs to convert to Christianity.

Recently this email regarding Betty Griffiths was received by Mmasape who asked for it to be printed.

Good evening,

Forgive me for writing but I came across your newsletter by accident!

I was searching for a phone number for a friend of my late mother. We continued to correspond at Christmas after mum died in 2012 but was concerned, I did not hear from her this past Christmas. That friend was Miss Betty Griffiths.

So, it is with great sadness I learn of her passing. I read the tributes from her friends which are lovely and describe the lady we knew.

If I may share a little...

She attended Exmouth Convent School in Devon, with my mum April Jones (later becoming Edwards), and always reminisced that she remembered the words to twelfth night when she played the part of Maria! She always wrote of her happy memories of Exmouth and 'those wartime years'! I don't know why she would have been in Exmouth possibly she was an evacuee.

She always wrote of the joy she got from helping out at her church. The times she would be serving Christmas dinners and the joy she got from her dogs over the years.

She would always sign her letters from Betty (who used to be Winnie the pooh)! I can't remember why!!

FOOD MEMORIES from Lorraine

Old English Trifle. (no Jelly)

Aged 19, along with Peter I was invited to our first dinner party by my future sister-in-law. In awe of just about everything she produced; I was particularly impressed with the dessert and have made it ever since, as it soon became a family favourite for special occasions.

The ingredients are:

1 small madeira cake or 2 raspberry jam swiss rolls
A small glass of good quality orange squash
A small glass of dry sherry (optional but better with)
1 punnet of fresh raspberries (optional)
1 pint of homemade custard
250mls double cream
250mls fromage frais
Toppings – crushed chocolate flake or toasted sliced almonds.

Use a fairly shallow dish of your choice approx. 3 to 4 inches deep. Arrange sliced cake or swiss roll in dish. Pour on orange juice and sherry and leave to soak. Layer raspberries on top.

Meanwhile make 1 pint custard using custard powder and pour onto the cake. Cover with cling film to prevent a skin forming and leave to cool. Whip cream and fromage frais together and pipe or drop spoonful's of the cream on the custard evenly until it is covered. Sprinkle on your chosen topping and chill well.

Works well made in small trifle dishes.

Easter Colouring



Supermarkets and pharmacies offer a safe place for victims of Domestic Abuse.

In response to the increase in domestic abuse incidents during the past year, Asda, Morrison's, Sainsbury, and Tesco have joined Boots in offering a room to shelter those suffering Domestic Abuse. In Boots you ask for Ani and you will be shown into a consulting room where you will receive support. Likewise, in the supermarkets you ask at the healthcare counter to use the consulting room. Staff have been trained how to respond and offer appropriate support to those in need.

Call the National Domestic Abuse helpline on 0808 2000 247. Download the Bright sky App.

Bright Sky is a mobile app and website for anyone experiencing domestic abuse, or who is worried about someone else. Launched in partnership with Vodafone, the app includes questionnaires to assess the safety of a relationship, plus a section on dispelling myths around domestic and sexual abuse. The website is focused on how to spot the signs of domestic abuse, advice on how to support someone you have concerns for, and ways to find help.

Both have access to a unique UK-wide directory of specialist domestic abuse support services with contact details, and nationwide helplines that are available 24/7.



If you hang a hot cross bun from your kitchen rafters on Good Friday, legend has it that the bread will remain fresh and mould-free throughout the entire year. This harkens back to the body of Christ, which, according to the Bible, did not show any signs of decay after his crucifixion and prior to his resurrection. The bun should be replaced each year on Good Friday. Later in the year, the buns were sometimes broken up, mixed with water and treated as a medicine.
