Circuit Newsletter

Dear friends,

As I write we have just celebrated Pentecost and we're rapidly heading towards June, then the summer (that was on Monday!), then September and well, I'll stop there!!

In his letter for May, Kido mentioned the book we are using as our guide for the Circuit Easter to Pentecost Bible Study: Acts: Catching Up with the Spirit.

Our penultimate session was entitled, 'Saints around the Edges' and examined the 'saints' who had a cameo role in the story of the early church and also the many others who, often, were unnamed. (The 120 in Acts 1:15).

Those of you who attended the 'welcome' service for Mmasape and Kido way back in September, may remember that our theme for this year is celebrating the 'Ministry of the whole people of God'. This is about recognising, enabling and encouraging every member and adherent within our churches to feel they have a contribution to make to the life of the Circuit and/or their local church and to offer it. Sadly, in most churches it is 20% of the people who do 80% of the work; to use a familiar expression. This is clearly not the model emerging from our study of the early church: It wasn't perfect but it can teach us a lot.

The example set by the early church is one where everyone was involved in one way or another, whether the role was

behind the scenes. Everyone's contribution and involvement resulted in a church community where, 'the Lord added to their number day by day those who were being saved'. (Acts 2: 47). Through each person playing their part, each member can give their full time and effort to one area, rather than having to spread themselves over many different roles and be less effective. (See Acts 6 and the choosing of the first Deacons!):-)

Paul echoes this sentiment in 1 Cor 12 where he talks of there being one body but many parts ... and all of us have a part to play in the Life, Ministry & Mission of God's Church - whether it's a greater or lesser part. Remember, each part is crucial to the effective life of the body of Christ - the Church. Obviously, a body cannot function if every part of it is not fulfilling the role it was created to do or if every part is wanting to do the same thing.

God's challenge to each of us is, 'am I fulfilling the role or ministry that God has called me for?' As Lynn and I consider our future ministry, we must discern where God wants us to be, whether that is in the BD&I Circuit or if it is time to move on in 2025? Whatever we are trying to discern or decide, it is not an easy task and requires us to be open and focused on what God is saying and where He is calling us to be.

The Ministry of the whole people of God requires us all to commit to the full life of the local church, Circuit and world-wide church; it requires us to support the work of God through prayer, fellowship and the practical roles which need our attention: Our ministry is to serve God's Kingdom.

And all this we do, not in our own strength but in the power of the Holy Spirit who was given you God's Church (i.e. You & Me) at Pentecost. The Holy Spirit was/is given by a generous God, not just at Pentecost but continually, so that we may have the energy, grace, love and power to be the disciples God calls us to be; serving in the places He needs us to be.

At a time when church membership is decreasing, it is even more important that we encourage and enable each other to play their part. To recognise and affirm the 'saints around the edges' who rarely step into the spotlight but without whom our church would struggle even more than we do now.

So let us commit ourselves to the guidance and resourcing of the Holy Spirit, that we might all be fulfilling the Ministry which God has called us to with joy and peace.



I doubt there are many people who look forward to a dental appointment, unless of course one has raging toothache but there are some of us of a certain age and by way of demographics who lived in an area, whereby the very mention of two words would reduce them to quivering wrecks.

'Goulton Road', it means nothing to you dear reader but I can assure you that when I met my future husband, upon discovering we had both attended the same Primary school (albeit four years apart) our immediate response was, " Do you remember Goulton Road."

Before I proceed I should explain: Goulton Road was the local dental clinic where, as school age children we would have to attend for our check ups and possible treatment.

To bring those childhood memories to mind now seems to sound almost archaic but it was the best we could expect as post war babies, the NHS was in its infancy and we were fortunate to get the care we did at the time.

Ray and I recalled similar experiences with regard to walking from our homes to attend the clinic and dreading the possibility of having a tooth filled or even pulled out!

Upon entering the clinic we all had to sit on a long bench, squashed up. As a child every adult seems so tall and to be seated on a low bench they seemed

Even taller and their white coats made them appear foreboding anyway. For some reason I thought if I sat very still they would forget about me and then I could go home but of course that was not going to happen was it? I can still 'see' that dentist now, he was a large man with a deep voice and he just invoked a fear in all of us, I am sure he was not the ogre we all thought he was but looking back, he was just doing a job with the tools of the time.

The days of modern dentistry were a long way off and as time went by, I came to accept that things could only get better and they did. The Goulton Road experience formed a part of my life that has been relayed to a number of dentists I have encountered over the years.


They have probably studied dentistry of that era, it doesn't seem all that long ago to me but I guess it's for History books now!

REDBRIDGE RAIN GARDENS



Rain gardens are being installed in the borough as part of works to help reduce flood risks in Redbridge, and local people are already seeing the benefits.

The eco-friendly water drainage systems feature plants, shrubs, and other greenery, and are designed to absorb rainwater and drain it away slowly to help stop sewer systems becoming overwhelmed – one of the causes of localised flooding.

Over the last two years several locations around the borough that have been severely impacted by flooding have benefitted from the installation of rain gardens. Among them is Malford Grove, in South Woodford, where repeated reports of surface water flooding had been recorded during periods of heavy rainfall.

The council installed a rain garden at the site last summer designed to absorb surface level water, store it, and then gradually release the water into the sewer system, and it has been successfully doing the job during bouts of heavy rain.

Since being installed, there have been no reports of surface water flooding in the area, with similar results also being reported for the other rain gardens in the borough.

The existing 11 rain gardens across the borough have the capacity to collectively absorb and store around 113,400 litres of rainwater. One five-minute shower a day uses around 40 litres of water, so that's just under eight years' worth of showers that can be held across the borough's rain gardens at any one time, helping alleviate the pressure on sewer systems in the borough.

The eco-friendly system also provides valuable habitats for wildlife in urban areas and creates more green spaces for local people due to the rain gardens attractive and natural design.

Instances of flash flooding are becoming more frequent as a consequence of climate change and while impossible to completely stop flooding, Redbridge is bolstering its resilience to it through a range of flood alleviation measures alongside rain gardens, to reduce the effects and likelihood of flooding in the borough.

Further rain gardens have been planned for the borough as part of a package of flood alleviation works earmarked for action under Redbridge's newly created Flood Risk Management Strategy and Surface Water Management Plan.

Cabinet Member for Environment and Sustainability Cllr Jo Blackman said: "Redbridge is seeing the effects of climate change with more frequent bouts of flooding from torrential rain. To help reduce the impact of flash floods in our local communities we are investing in a wide range of flood alleviation measures, including the use of rain gardens, in the most impacted parts of the borough. Rain gardens are a particularly eco-friendly way to help reduce flood risks in local areas that have previously been prone to flooding, and have the added benefit of being able to blend into the environment and improve biodiversity in the borough."

Many thanks to all for their birthday greetings, cards and gifts on the occasion of my 70th birthday. I had a lovely weekend in Norfolk celebrating with family, some of whom I hadn't seen for some time, and friends. The highlight was an afternoon tea trip on the Saturday aboard the Southern Comfort Mississippi Paddleboat.

Styled upon the paddle steamers that travelled the Mississippi River in the US from the early 1800s, the Southern Comfort Paddleboat is a purpose built pleasure boat for the Norfolk Broads, running trips from its mooring in the village of Horning along the River Bure.

The original steamboats on the Mississippi were propelled by steam-driven paddle wheels, and could navigate the river more quickly and effectively than barges or flatboats. They carried goods such as cotton, timber, and livestock up and down the river, expanding trade throughout the growing U S. However, steamboats could be dangerous—the boilers which created steam could build up too much pressure and explode. Steamboats were also susceptible to hitting obstacles such as rocks or logs, which could cause them to sink.

By contrast our trip on the Norfolk paddleboat held no such danger, taking us on a scenic trip along the Bure, with sights of old thatched houses, windmills and the reed beds and of course the wildlife. We passed other holiday cruisers, sailing yachts and a wherry.

Keeping an eye on the weather forecast all week, I couldn't have asked for a better day. I was very thankful that it all turned out as planned. I knew I would be expected to say a few words to my guests and as I'm not one for giving speeches, Jeremy suggested I write an ode. So after cutting my beautiful birthday cake, I began:

Last year at Cedar Lodge on a day sunny and fair,
When Jeremy and I were staying there
He said "so your big birthday what you going to do?",
I sighed and I shrugged and said I didn't have a clue!
To be honest the thought of that zero made me cry,
I gazed out the window, and at that moment the Southern Comfort passed by.

Raysin Hope

In June 2008 my husband Ray was diagnosed with a Grade 4 brain tumour and throughout his illness an incredible number of people were very kind to him.

I wanted to show my gratitude and spoke to Ray's Neuro Nurse, who kindly advised

me to have some time for myself and promised that one day we would catch up again.

During those months I discovered that it was her wish to have a Support Group for people who were diagnosed with a brain tumour. In March 2009 I became a volunteer

at a group she was setting up in the reception area of Oncology at Queens Hospital Romford. It ran for a few months but as the nurse had to take time for more studies

it was decided that the group had to cease.

I started to think of ways that I could set up a group myself and with the help of family and friends we formed a committee and launched our fundraising with a coffee morning at The Drive church. I decided to call our fundraiser 'Raysin Hope', as my mother-in-law always called my husband Raysin when he was a little boy and Hope was what we had for our fundraising effort. I ordered T Shirts and leaflets with a logo printed on them and the coffee morning took off. With money to bank I tried to register as a charity but as we had to raise a total of £5000 in any one year, I wasn't sure if we could hit that target.

Fortunately, my own bank considered my request to set up an account in the name of Raysin Hope but I was told that I could not have online banking but only a cheque book.

Since 2009 our fundraiser has functioned upon 'trust' alone. Two years ago my bank agreed to my request for online banking and a debit card which has made gifting easier.

Initially we held Tea Afternoons, A Quiz Night, Sixties Night and Winter Walks. In 2010 I walked a large section of the Yorkshire Coast to Coast Walk. The following year I walked 44 miles along Hadrian's Wall. Our funds began to grow and I decided to contact a charity which at the time was called, The Brain Tumour Charity UK. They were very interested in my plan to set up a support group and told me they would provide a coordinator.

I searched for a suitable meeting room and with Raysin Hope Funds our first support group met in January 2012. Along with the co-ordinator we met each month at the Salvation Army Centre in Romford and all costs were funded by Raysin Hope. As time passed by, the Charity decided that they no longer wanted to work with support groups and as we were financially independent, I carried on running the group with the help of my friend. We are in our thirteenth year now having managed through Covid with Zoom meetings and an occasional meet up in Havering Country Park. Raysin Hope is fortunate to have many supporters and I am indebted to them all for their generosity and for putting their trust in me. I hope to continue with our initial aim, which was to help people in many ways, albeit small.


